YEIDA identifies land for hostels

Noida

The Yamuna Expressway Industrial Development Authority (YEIDA) has identified land for building two hostels for working women.

The authority has selected sectors and marked 26,560 square meter of land for each hostel. So, preparations have begun to build two hostels for working women in the Yamuna Expressway Industrial Development Authority area.

YEIDA CEO Dr Arunvir Singh said that the proposal to build four hostels in Noida, Greater Noida and Yamuna City has been passed. Out of these, one hostel each will be built in Noida, Greater Noida and two in Yamuna City.

For this purpose, the Yamuna Authority will provide free land. A total of 6.56 acre of land will be given for the hostel in the district. Land has been marked in sector-17 of the Yamuna City and another place. These sectors are near the airport and film city and near Yamuna Expressway.

It is worth mentioning that after the construction of the hostel, women coming from other states, countries and districts will not have to face difficulty.

Delhi Police SI held for accepting bribe of Rs 10,000

The vigilance department has apprehended a Delhi Police sub-inspector for taking a bribe of Rs 10,000 to issue notice to accused persons in a fraud case, an official said on Tuesday.

The accused SI, Shripal, was posted at Laxmi Nagar police station.

The vigilance unit received a complaint from a Laxmi Nagar resident who runs a business of agricultural products alleging that he was defrauded in July by some persons based in Karnataka and Bengal, an officer said.

"He lodged a complaint in the matter at Laxmi Nagar police station and the matter was transferred to SI Shripal. When no action was taken on his complaint, the complainant approached Shripal and requested him to initiate action. But Shripal

Delhi Air quality 'very poor' for 14th day temperatures likely to drop from Nov 17

Delhi's air quality remained "very poor" for a 14th consecutive day on Tuesday, with an AQI reading of 334, as vehicular emission was the biggest contributor to the city's pollution, accounting for 15-4 per cent.

The Air Quality Index (AQI) has been in the "very poor" category since October 30, when it was recorded at 307.

An AQI between zero and 50 is considered "good", 51 and 100 "satisfactory", 101 and 200 "moderate", 201 and 300 "poor", 301 and 400 "very poor", 401 and 450 "severe" and above 450 "severe plus".

According to the Centre's Decision Support System for Air Quality Management, vehicular emissions will remain the top contributor to Delhi's pollution over the next two days, with an estimated share of approximately 10 per cent. On Tuesday, it was 15 per cent.

The national capital's 24-hour average AQI, recorded at 4 pm every day, stood at 334, down from 354 on Monday. Air pollution levels reached the "severe" category at one station in Anand Vihar.

Across the country, three stations registered "very poor" air quality, including Delhi, while one station in Bihar's Hajipur recorded the AQI in the "severe" category with a reading of 427.

Delhi recorded the fourth-



worst air quality in the country, ranked behind Hajipur, Chandigarh (349) and Patna (340), according to the data.

Meanwhile, the prominent pollutants in Delhi on Tuesday were PM10, according to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB).

PM10 refers to a particulate matter that is 10 micrometre or less in diameter. These tiny solid or liquid particles suspended in the air can be inhaled into the lungs.

The sources of PM10 include dust, pollen, mold, vehicle exhaust and industrial emissions, which can cause respiratory problems as they penetrate deep into the lungs, potentially leading to issues such as asthma, bronchitis and other respiratory diseases.

Long-term exposure to it can also increase the risk of heart and lung diseases.

Apart from transporta-

tion, other contributors to Delhi's pollution include farm fires, though data was not available on the website of the Consortium for Research on Agroecosystem Monitoring and Modeling from Space, which tracks the number of stubble-burning incidents reported each day.

Priyanka Singh, programme lead at the Delhi-based independent think tank Council on Energy, Environment and Water (CEEW), said the AQI has consistently remained above 350 so far in November, except on November 10 and November 12, when it was 334 due to relatively higher wind speeds.

She said according to the Air Quality Early Warning System (AQEWS), the AQI is expected to stay around 350 for the next two days. From November 14, the AQI is an-

anticipated to drop below 350, with a further decrease below 300 expected by November 19.

This improvement may be due to a reduction in the number of farm fires after November 15. Although the forecast is that the air quality will improve, citizens are advised to limit outdoor activities and take precautions, such as wearing masks, to reduce exposure, Singh added.

Meanwhile, the capital is experiencing unusually-high temperatures this November as the specific weather conditions that usually trigger the onset of winter are not aligning yet.

In mid-November, both the daytime and nighttime temperatures in Delhi remain well above seasonal norms.

As of the second week of the month, daily highs continue to hover above 30 de-

grees Celsius, while nighttime temperatures range between 16 degrees Celsius and 18 degrees Celsius — a stark contrast to previous years, when the mercury would typically drop to between 10 degrees Celsius and 15 degrees Celsius by now.

The current weather pattern and the delayed onset of winter, an India Meteorological Department (IMD) official said, "Each year, a specific pattern of seasonal winds and temperature drops lead to the onset of winter. But this year, those conditions have not aligned yet."

"The northern wind flow and western disturbances, which typically bring colder air, have not fully set in. However, we expect this trend to shift around November 17, after which temperatures are likely to start falling," he said.

A layer of morning smog is covering major parts of the capital, with chilly winds early in the morning and late in the evening bringing a winter bite to Delhi, where the temperature reached 32.8 degrees Celsius on Tuesday, 4.3 notches above normal. Humidity fluctuated between 64 per cent and 96 per cent during the day.

The weather office has forecast morning mist and shallow fog, followed by clear skies on Wednesday, with the minimum and maximum temperatures expected to hover around 16 degrees Celsius and 32 degrees Celsius respectively.

Five arrested for gang-raping minor aunt in southeast Delhi

Five men were arrested for allegedly gang-raping a 17-year-old girl and her aunt at a house in southeast Delhi's Lajpat Nagar area, police said on Tuesday.

The incident took place on Saturday night and the matter came to the fore when the duo reached Safdarjung Hospital for the minor's treatment on Sunday.

The accused are identified as Shivam Parchha, Aman Pal, Ashish alias Anshuman, Amar Mehra and Abhishek alias Ishu, police said, adding that they work as drivers and security guards in parts of south Delhi.

On Sunday at 4 am, police received a call from Safdarjung Hospital regarding the sexual assault of a minor girl and her aunt.

A police team reached the hospital, where the state-



ments of both were recorded.

The girl's father works as a carpenter while her aunt's husband works as a food delivery executive in south Delhi. On Saturday night, they went to a club in Defence Colony where their entry was denied as the girl was underage, police said.

While they were standing near the club at midnight, the accused came in a Maruti Swift Dzire car and offered to take them to another club in Malviya Nagar.

"Both the females agreed to sit in the car. We do not know whether the accused took them to a club in Malviya Nagar but they

drove to Gurugram," a senior police officer said.

The women in their statement said the accused offered them soft drinks mixed with alcohol and later, took them to a house belonging to one of them in Kasturba Niketan.

"The accused then forced themselves on them before dropping them at their house near the Ashram area. Both the victims live in the same locality," the officer said.

The next morning, when the minor felt pain in her abdomen, they went to Safdarjung Hospital, where she was admitted and police were informed.

Following their medical examinations, a case under sections 64(1) (punishment for rape) and 70(1) (gang rape) of the BN and the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act was registered.

LG directs for appointment of 2,346 Home Guards

New Delhi

Delhi LG Governor VK Saxena has directed the services department for immediate appointment of eligible candidates on 2,346 posts of home guards, who qualified the written and physical tests, Raj Nivasi officials said on Tuesday.

Enrolment of 10,285 home guards was earlier approved by the LG in January this year with 33.33 per cent reservation for women applicants. An advertisement was issued for filling up the vacancies in reply to which over one lakh applications were submitted.

A total of 32,551 applicants later qualified the physical measurement and efficiency test.

MCD fines Rs 2.69 crore for violations of dust pollution norms in Delhi

The Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) has issued fines amounting to Rs 2.69 crore for violation of dust control norms during construction and demolition (C&D) activities between April and October this year, according to official data.

The MCD has deployed 372 surveillance teams, with a workforce of 1,295 personnel under its Winter Action Plan 2024-25 to monitor open burning and illegal C&D waste dumping across the city.

Rs 16.85 lakh have been collected so far in fines that are being imposed as a measure to curb the "very poor" pollution levels in the city. Air quality in parts of Delhi are "severe", prompting authorities to implement the Stage II of the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP).

For C&D site inspec-



tions, 146 teams with 562 personnel operated around the clock. Inspections of open burning of waste are handled by 226 patrolling teams with 733 personnel tasked with preventing fires that could worsen air quality, according to an official report.

Despite these efforts, no challans were issued for open burning violations during the April-October period, signalling a focus primarily on dust control at construction sites, it said.

As Delhi's air quality remains consistently bad, with health risks linked to it mounting, authorities continue to push for stringent action to curb sources of pollution.

Under Stage II of GRAP, additional restrictions are imposed, such as bans on the use of coal and firewood in restaurants and the use of diesel generators, except for essential services. Parking charges are also raised to encourage people to switch to public transport.
